Goals/Objectives to be accomplished:	Expand crisis options through the development of a diversion center.
	Diversion Center is focused on pre- arrest diversion at present. I.e. Keeping people out of the CJ system to begin with.
Challenges/Issues for progress:	Safe, affordable housing for the underprivileged in high demand resulting in a shortage overall in Amarillo.
Milestones accomplished since last justice forum (May 2023)—Examples: regular meetings, pilot projects, changes in policies or procedures, and other.	 Milestone No. 1- TPC was awarded 1.4 million in grant money to go towards creating a diversion center. Milestone No. 2- A building has been identified to house the diversion center; Bivins Pointe at 6600 Kilgore Drive.
What data or outcomes are being gathered/tracked to assess progress?	- Data from CIT officers reflecting numbers of arrests resulting in Class B and Class C misdemeanors.
What data does this group need to know to be more effective in datadriven decision making?	 211 will need guidance from diversion center to help them identify candidates for diversion from calls received. Current criteria being used by Call Center Priority Group is: Someone who reports being in active mental crisis Someone off their mental health medication who needs/wants to get back on them. Anyone who expresses a need for mental health counseling. At this time MCOT and CIT will be the first responders to the Diversion Center. 211 will be working with DC Staff to develop a way to coordinate referrals and resources for people who accessed the DC through MCOT and CIT.
